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The following schedule sets out the amendments to the Submission draft Hampshire Minerals and Waste Core Strategy, to extend it into the Wiltshire area of the New Forest National Park.

- **Paragraph 2.0 – 2.2 – The New Forest National Park**

#### 2.0 The New Forest National Park

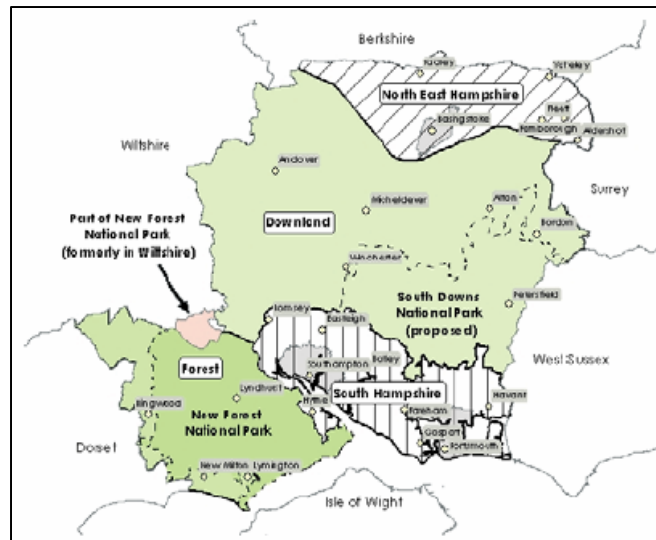
2.1 Minerals and waste planning for the New Forest National Park was the responsibility of Hampshire County Council until 1 April 2006. The New Forest National Park Authority becomes the strategic and local planning authority with responsibility for minerals and waste planning on 1 April and has agreed to join the three councils in the joint approach to this Strategy.

2.2 Minerals and waste planning for a small part of the New Forest National Park was the responsibility of Wiltshire County Council prior to 1 April 2006. ~~Although this area is not included within this Strategy, it is hoped that sufficient consultation can be undertaken and appropriate procedures completed so that this area can be included within the Strategy by the time it is adopted.~~ *Thereafter the New Forest National Park Authority became the minerals and waste planning authority for the whole National Park. The Authority will apply the Hampshire Core Strategy to cover the area of the National Park within Wiltshire.*

- **Paragraph 3.9 – Geographical areas**

3.9 These four geographically distinct areas are illustrated below:



- **Paragraph 13.0 – Other development plan documents and saved policies**

13.3 When adopted, the Strategy will replace all the existing minerals and waste policies within the Hampshire County Structure Plan (1996-2011) – adopted in January 2000. Similarly, the Strategy will replace all the Hampshire, Portsmouth and Southampton Minerals and Waste Local Plan (adopted 1998) except policies 19, 21, 38 and 43, relating to specific sites and safeguarding which will continue to be ‘saved’. The relationship between the policies in this Strategy and the previous policies is shown in Appendix 1.

*New* Once adopted, the Strategy will also replace the ‘saved’ policies that cover the Wiltshire area of the New Forest National Park contained within the adopted Wiltshire County Structure Plan (2006); the adopted Wiltshire and Swindon Waste Local Plan (2005); and the adopted Wiltshire and Swindon Minerals Local Plan (2001). The relationship between the ‘saved’ Wiltshire policies and this Strategy is shown in Appendix 1.

13.4 Prior to adoption all the existing saved policies are saved through their inclusion in the Council’s Development Schemes.

- **Paragraph 18.11 – Landfill**

18.11 In 2005, it was estimated that Hampshire had ~~2.7~~ 3.6 million tonnes of *un-engineered* ~~unused~~ non-hazardous landfill void remaining. This means that additional non-hazardous landfill capacity will need to be found for

about 4.2 2.2 million tonnes (allowing for 30% being inert waste for use as cover and landfill engineering).
