 - Enhanced potential for water quality
 - Optimise synergies





Countryside Stewardship

Phased introduction through 2015:

Preliminary grants (2015 only)

- 2015 Woodland Grant: window Feb 17th to end May, woodland management plans and woodland tree health window remains open
- 2. 2015 Water Grant: window March 2nd to end April

Facilitation Fund: 2015 window March 17th – May 13th

Full Scheme

From July 2015 (a couple of capital items not until early 2016)


- Mid Tier multi-annual
- Higher Tier multi-annual
- Capital Grants

Replaces and incorporates the elements in the two preliminary grants



Key Principles

- 5 year agreements- exceptions can be made for more complex options (woodland, wetland habitats etc).
- Biodiversity and Water are key objectives
- Includes Forestry Schemes and CSF
- Open to all- but competitive so must meet objectives laid out in statements of priorities
- Applications submitted on new Rural Payments System.
 Guidance available on Gov.uk
- A business can only apply for 1 application per year



Statements of Priorities and scoring

- Applications should reflect Countryside
 Stewardship priorities and show that they provide value for money.
- To score applications, we will use:
- the priorities highlighted in the national scheme targeting framework
- the land management options applicants have chosen for their land parcels

Farmers and other land managers can apply for a Countryside Stewardship agreement to help pay for work to address a range of environmental objectives. Each area has a range of features and issues that have been identified as priorities for funding and these are set out within this statement.

Use this document to:

- identify the priority features and issues targeted within this area
- help inform you when considering which options to choose as part of your application

Further guidance will be available shortly in the Countryside Stewardship scheme manual (including the water quality options table) and the list of management options and items.

Who is eligible

Countryside Stewardship is open to Land Managers who are one of the following:

- owner occupiers;
- tenants (including farmers who may have an agreement with the landlord labelled as a licence but who in practice have wider land management responsibilities)
- landlords
- common land rights holders
